## The Dean writes...

THE season of mists and mellow fruitfulness is an active one for the Cathedral. The first weekend in October (Saturday 3rd and Sunday 4th) sees the Cathedral hosting a celebration of Hampshire Harvest both in the Cathedral and the Outer Close. The significance of the Environment, of which we are an integral part, and of Farming and its methods is now high profile. The recognition of the importance of 'local' in the range of ways in which we acquire our food and the need to regulate our demands on nature with some self-restraint are no longer in doubt. A responsible relationship with the natural order, a sense of global accountability, and a realisation that moral issues are raised by our life-styles all re-connect Harvest to our spiritual awareness. The insistence of the Judaeo-Christian tradition that the world we live in is gifted from God and displays the fingerprints of his love and goodness has a renewed relevance. Hampshire Harvest is rightly celebrated in Hampshire's Cathedral.

There has been a partnership between Hampshire Fare,



the New Forest Show, Sparsholt College, Hampshire Markets and the NFU to present two days of activities in the Outer Close (10am – 5pm) including displays and entertainment, as well as exhibitions in the Cathedral itself. Malcolm Crabtree, Managing Director of the Leckford (John Lewis) Estate will be the guest speaker. The focal Hampshire Harvest Celebration Service, to which all are welcome, will be in the Cathedral at 3.30pm. The Harvest produce of Hampshire will be presented, and the Bishop of Winchester will give the address.

Very appropriately the AGM of the Dean Garnier Garden Trust will take place on Saturday 3rd October, with a talk at 2.30pm and the meeting at 3pm in the Education Centre. The Trust cares for the beautiful amenity of the Garden, and is always pleased to receive new offers of help. If you cannot make the meeting but would like to be involved, leave your name with the Dean's PA in the Cathedral Office (01962 857205) and she will pass it on.

Harvest Weekend also sees the Diocesan Readers' Service on the Saturday morning and on the same day the popular 'Be a Chorister for an Afternoon'.

The weekend following brings around Law Sunday (11th October) and the preacher at the Law Service at 11am is the Revd Professor Peter Gomes of Harvard University. He is responsible for the University's Memorial Church in Harvard Yard, and one of America's most sought-after preachers. It will be good to welcome him back to the Cathedral. He will also be giving the Founda-

tion Lecture at the University of Winchester (see page 4). All are welcome. We also look forward to hosting the University Graduations during the days beginning the 21st October.

One World Week commences on Sunday 18th October. It brings together both themes of environmental concern and justice, and so pulls together the strands that have been uppermost in our thoughts as October begins. We shall be marking that special week in our worship on the Sunday. In particular, our student chaplaincy contact with the University, Craig Philbrick, will be giving an account of his experiences in Delhi helping with an all-age social project (see pages 4 & 7 for details). This is the first social event managed by the Outreach Action and Advisory group, so do please support it.

On Sunday 18th October at 3.30pm Evensong the Royal British Legion will be laying up a standard in the Cathedral. We are pleased to enable this to happen as it is the Royal British Legion which continues to support needy soldiers and their families throughout their lifetime. That is, long after the conflicts in which they served have ceased to claim the limelight.

These are a clutch of events taking place in and around the Cathedral in October which highlight the Cathedral's significance within the life of the Community. All of us whose work and service is to care for the Cathedral and its life are part of a greater vision. We are called to be a life-giving, enabling, transforming presence.

Through opening a door of welcome into the Cathedral and its life, we are also charged to open a door of understanding into the wonder and love of God and how that 'makes a difference'. Jesus used words like 'salt' and 'light' and 'leaven' to describe his followers as a transforming ingredient in the world. As a Cathedral we have a particular calling to live out that vision. We are not a club of the like-minded, but a community ready to serve. We must not lose the fire of that identity.

I have been aware on several occasions recently how people in the secular world refer to me as 'Dean of Winchester Cathedral'. I always correct them to 'Dean of Winchester'. The point is that (just like Bishops and Incumbents) the task relates to the wider community. We are all commissioned to work from the Community of Faith but within the wider community. That is the brief that the Church of England has accepted as part of the fibre of its soul. It is to that which Christ calls us all: 'The Son of Man came not to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many'. (Mark 10 v45)

There will be an opportunity to reflect on our identity as a Cathedral at the Community Day on Sunday 16th November when Frank Field MP will be our keynote speaker. Do put the date in your diary.



# Worship

Canon Michael on the importance of a good harvest.

SITTING at home in the cool light of day, I plan to sell my house in France when, hopefully, the climate to do so will be more favourable. Crossing the Channel and sitting outside the 18th century manor house with a cool glass of wine, the decision to proceed with a sale becomes much more difficult. The gardens look over a valley on to the River Vire, the forest climbs in the distance where the sound of the traditional hunting horns echo around. It is for me, and others who stay there, a little piece of heaven and I am grateful that the village is over a mile away as I can be heard singing songs of praise, loudly!

Surrounded by little else but bird song and the noise of the occasional tractor, in such a context it is easy to believe in God the Creator, whose purposes are good and who delights us with his gifts. Those of us fortunate to live near the Cathedral know only too well that however hard or complex life becomes at times, to share in such beauty is a real tonic.

The challenge of Harvest is to celebrate God's creativity in the not so lovely; to witness His hand at work among the ugly and disfigured, both physically, emotionally and spiritually. Nothing is beyond His reach and nothing beyond His care. When we look at creation through God's eyes we appreciate beauty where the world sees nothing beautiful. We have the evidence of the Cross and empty tomb to convince us; what was shameful and utterly degrading is transformed into the instrument of our salvation.

We can take heart. Even our deepest darkest places can be, in the words of a book written about the late great Mother Teresa, "Something beautiful for God". The Lord who formed the heavens and



earth out of nothing is not phased by our secret darkness and will transfigure us.

Harvest is a time to praise God for "all good gifts around us" but perhaps just as much for the less obvious and more complex, those things and people who go unnoticed and even thought to be beyond hope.

We will be holding our annual Be a Chorister afternoon on October 3rd and the participants will join the Choir to sing a simple anthem by Philip Wilby at Evensong. A couple of pieces are returning to the Choir's repertoire after an absence. Orlando Gibbons' setting of O Lord in thy wrath (9th) is one of the great short anthems of the 16th century, whilst William Walton's Set me as a seal (10th) vividly captures the phrase 'for love is strong as death'. The Girls and Lay Clerks will be singing Hubert Parry's majestic anthem Blest pair of sirens (11th) and we will be welcoming members of the Royal College of Organists to Evensong on the 17th with SS Wesley's Ascribe unto the Lord.

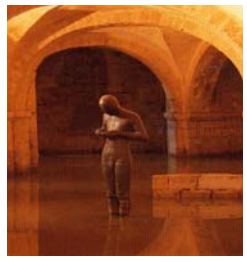

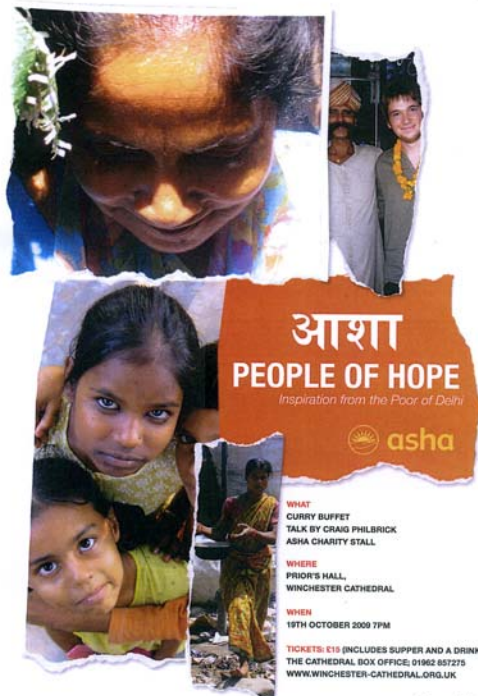
# People

Craig Philbrick is known to many as a former Virger of the Cathedral, and has long had a personal interest in different causes around the world. Now at the University studying Theology, Craig is also our liaison with the chaplaincy there, and we have asked him to share some of his early experiences.

Hi, my name is Craig and I am the Mission Link between the Cathedral and Winchester University Chaplaincy. I am passionate about student mission, serving churches and working with students. Within the UK, students in further and higher education form one of the largest unreached groups of people untouched by the message of Jesus. It is this that makes my job so exciting and challenging.

I hear you saying, 'But we have no students, so what is the point of having a Student Worker?'. This is of course true (for now). However, what's really exciting is that the Church of England has 42 cathedrals that offer local, national and international communities daily worship. With a few simple changes and a bit of creativity cathedrals could engage with young people - be that a Rave in the Nave, late night cathedral tours or some form of fresh expression. I believe that cathedrals have to win their place within the community in which they find themselves; they have to remove the feeling of exclusion that pilgrims, young people and tourists may feel.

A great example of how our cathedral is engaging with young students is our Friends International Night on the 27th November. For the first time ever, the Cathedral is opening its doors to one hundred international students from across Hampshire for a night of seasonal fun. We are having evening tours of the Cathedral, tower, library and crypt. The event is to be evangelistic and to explain the Christmas



story, and indeed the meaning of the cross, etc., particularly relevant as things in the Cathedral are pointed out and the link to what we believe can be made. And, to top it off, we will have traditional mulled wine and mince pies in the Undercroft. The seasonal period is the most difficult and loneliest time of the academic year for international students and has the highest suicide rate. What's so exciting about this event is that the Cathedral is engaging with them and helping them to belong.

As I hope you can tell, I am very excited about my pioneering role at the Cathedral. For me cathedrals are nothing if they are not accessible holy places to which all kinds of people, both young and old, can feel that they belong. This mission of being accessible to all has to also work alongside the central purpose of a cathedral, which is to be a Christian Church.
